Pastor Karis Message

This past year, we've spent much of our time becoming a "radically welcoming" community of faith. Radical

welcome is first and foremost a spiritual practice. It combines the Christian ministry of welcome and hospitality with a faithful commitment to doing the theological, spiritual and systemic work to eliminate historic, systemic barriers that limit the genuine embrace of groups generally marginalized in mainline churches (young adults, the poor, LGBTQ people, people of color, people with disabilities). Recently, I sat with a new member to Community Lutheran Church. He shared the story how he found himself in our midst. He and his spouse searched for more than two years for an inclusive faith community. They found that few churches truly meant the words "All are welcome". Time after time, this couple was left disappointed by congregations that said they were open to everyone but their internal structural practices were exclusionary. It was while shopping at the local Harris Teeter he noticed one of Community's food pantry volunteers stocking up on canned discount items. The volunteer eagerly shared how Community Lutheran proclaims the Gospel through it's openness and service to others. This is a radical welcome experience.

The Reverend Stephanie Spellers says this about a radical welcome ministry approach:

"Those who are marginalized includes any group that is likely (or would reasonably expect) to experience patterns of historic, systemic oppression and marginalization in your congregation and/or denomination, especially given your church's dominant race, culture, language, generation, socioeconomic class, education level, sexual orientation and physical ability.

In your church, which of these groups hold power—that is, the ability to have authority or influence, and to have their story, culture, and voice shape the congregation? These groups are your power center. Which groups do not hold this power? Whose story does not yet shape the history, culture, worship and identity of the church?" We are evolving as we join Jesus in stretching our arms and embracing these brothers and sisters, and allowing our heart and our congregation's life to be transformed by the presence of others, of those new to this community in every place within our leadership structures. This practice is radical, and it is truly welcoming. Radically welcoming communities aren't perfect, and may never truly "arrive," but we are becoming . . .



If the Bible isn't a science book or an instruction manual, what is it? What do people mean when they say the Bible is inspired? When New York Times bestselling author Rachel Held Evans found herself asking these questions, she embarked on a journey to better understand what the Bible is and how it's meant to be read.


~What she discovered changed her - and it can change you, too~

Evans knows firsthand how a relationship with the Bible can be as real and as complicated as a relationship with a family member or close friend. In Inspired, Evans explores contradictions and questions from her own experiences with the Bible, including:

- $\Delta$  If the Bible was supposed to explain the mysteries of life, why does it leave the reader with so many questions?
- $\Delta$  What does it mean to be chosen by God?
- $\Delta$  To what degree did the Holy Spirit guide the preservation of these narratives, and is there something sacred to be uncovered beneath all these human fingerprints?
- $\Delta$  If the Bible has given voice to the oppressed, why is it also used as justification by their oppressors?

Drawing on the best in biblical scholarship and using her well-honed literary expertise, Evans examines some of our favorite Bible stories and possible interpretations, retelling them through memoir, original poetry, short stories, and even a short screenplay.

Undaunted by the Bible's most difficult passages and unafraid to ask the hard questions, Evans wrestles through the process of doubting, imagining, and debating the mysteries surrounding Scripture. Discover alongside Evans that the Bible is not a static text, but a living, breathing, captivating, and confounding book that can equip us and inspire us to join God's loving and redemptive work in the world.

Thanks for honoring the request to consider a tree planting in memory of Deacon Laura at Community Lutheran. I am forwarding the invitation to an "Earth Day" tree planting dedication of your ceremony by video. The purpose is to compile similar video dedications from across our synod to honor Deacon Laura's dedication to Creation Care Ministry in our synod. Pr. Karis, I have also attached a short video "The Soil Song". I included this because I think that your use of videos at the end of service is an effective way to close a worship. acknowledge our sadness over the passing of Deacon Laura in June 2023, we remember so many Creation Care projects she initiated as leader of the Delaware-Maryland Synod Creation Care Ministry Team.

### Deacon Laura Heller's Bio

Deacon Laura Heller's ordination as a deacon was held at St. Mark's Lutheran Church in Hampstead, MD on Earth Sunday in 2015.

Even before that, Laura served as the Coordinator for the Delaware-Maryland Synod Creation Care Ministry team from that time until her passing in June of 2023. Laura, a very dedicated servant, led and inspired many additional creation care "Stewards" for our synod churches. In addition to planning Creation Care events at every synod assembly since 2015, she also provided leadership and organized many Creation Care events throughout her almost 10 years of service in that role. One of her most successful endeavors provided the leadership to have 500 trees planted across our synod commemorating the 500th anniversary of the Protestant Reformation in 2017.
