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

Pastor Karis Message



The following newsletter article is granted to be shared by the ELCA Director of Federal Chaplaincy, Pastor Christopher Otten. It seems appropriate to share with Community Lutheran:

Our lectionary arrives at Acts, chapter 8 - the story about the Eunich. Who was this Ethiopian Eunuch? We took a look at his identity. That's when Aerosmith came up.

Did you know that Christianity has roots in Africa that run as deep and as old as the Nicene Creed? It's true.

Thanks to an appointed official from the Court of Candace, the good news of Jesus spread from the apostle Philip (Acts 8: 30) to this Treasurer/Official, across Ethiopia, and throughout the African continent in the infancy of the Christian movement.

While the Ethiopian Eunuch was clearly a person-of-faith (see Acts 8:27), the Jewish temple was not open to men who had been castrated, nor to those who appeared as anything other than Jewish men in ancient Israel/Palestine. The eunuch did not fit that expectation. He would have been neutered. Non-binary. Transgender. And as black/brown as any African of that era. While the Eunuch was spiritual and searching, traveling all the way from Africa to Jerusalem, he would not have been welcomed into the Jewish temple and its worship.

Yet, the book of Acts tells us that somehow, rather mysteriously, Philip gained access to that Royal Treasurer's chariot and entourage, he asked a sincere question (which I consider to be "a question that you don't know how someone else is going to answer"), and he brought the message of God's grace in Jesus with him in response. The Eunuch was on a journey all right! But much more than a sojourn from Ethiopia to Jerusalem. He was on a spiritual quest!

That's where you come in, people of faith. When people ask me what you do, I tell them, "Chaplains and Pastors and lay people are to **go** beyond the walls of the church to those who are beyond the wall of their homes."

After people have moved during different parts of their lives...into a retirement village or a hospital room, to an Army FOB or a Navy Destroyer, or into a prison or drug rehab, or even if they are riding in a chariot on a return trip from Jerusalem, Chaplains and Pastors and the laity **go.**

Like Philip, all of us are called to go to all sorts of people, in so many places, beyond the walls of the church, to engage in the spiritual questions, doubts, discernment,

joys, and struggles of this world and to bring the forgiveness, grace, and love of Jesus.

That's what Philip did. Because Philip followed the Spirit's guidance, and because he asked an honest question, listened, reflected, and shared, the entire continent of Africa was changed through God's grace in that Eunuch.

Thank you for what you do, people of God. I give God my gratitude that you take Jesus' love beyond the walls of the church to those whose spiritual lives can be enriched by your ministry.

Public Health and a New Pantry

Would you be surprised if the next prescription your doctor wrote was for vegetables? Access to fresh produce can be a major barrier to better health for food-insecure individuals, so Atrium Health Navicent in Macon, GA is working with SoSA gleaners to eliminate the obstacles to nutritious food in their community.

Atrium recently opened a "Food as Medicine" market with Macon community partners, including The Society of St. Andrew!

Patients needing food assistance or who have specific nutritional needs can make an appointment to shop at the free market. Patients take a shopping cart around the pantry and choose food they like and need. This "client choice" model is great for the patient, and it also reduces food waste because patients do not take food they will not eat. Clients can supplement what they have in their refrigerators and stretch their budgets further.

When there is gleaning in the Macon area, SoSA volunteers deliver farm-fresh produce to the Food as Medicine Market. In fact, staff members from Atrium have gleaned regularly with SoSA for three years at local farms, always bringing some back to the market to share!

"The Food as Medicine Market and Food Farmacy program will give individuals in our community tools to live healthier, prevent illness, and address serious health conditions that can be caused or worsened by insufficient intake of certain foods, like fresh fruits and vegetables," said Finley. Atrium's Food as Medicine Market recognizes food insecurity can cause lasting harm to the body.

SoSA volunteers work hard to get produce to the Food as Medicine Market, so lack of funds and access to fruits and vegetables will not determine someone's health outcomes.

Community partnerships, like the Food as Medicine Market in Macon are making a difference!



With all the fresh produce grown in our area, this is something we need to look into for our Food Pantry. We would need to coordinate with the growers and then secure a volunteer team from our membership that are able to glean the nearby fields. ~Mona Burns, Team Leader



The Society of St. Andrew brings people together to harvest and share healthy food, reduce food waste, and build caring communities by offering nourishment to hungry neighbors. The Society of St. Andrew is a 43-year old national nonprofit hunger-relief ministry that improves the environment by keeping good food out of landfills and feeds hungry people by sharing rescued fruits and vegetables with front-line feeding agencies (soup kitchens, shelters, food banks and food pantries, etc.) across the country. The Holy Spirit at Work Celebrating Our Growth



The month of May was filled with joy as we welcomed many new members into the congregation. The celebration of their membership caused me to look at how we have grown in numbers since last year. From March of 2023 to May of 2024 the number of voting members grew from 96 to 147 or 53.1%. Total disciples, which includes associate members and friends grew from 144 to 184 or 27.8%. This, my friends, is cause for joy and celebration and demonstrates how our ministries are working.

As we celebrate our growth in numbers, it must be

remembered that a successful congregation is defined by its ministries. Ministries that are measured not by numbers alone, but by their depth and impact to the community of God.

Growth is the result of loving and engaging the community, discipline in leading the ministries and faithfulness to God. Members must individually and corporately be guided by the truth of God's word and demonstrate love for one another. A successful church is a fellowship of Christians characterized by an uncompromising commitment to God's truth and an enthusiastic love for God and for people.

Many congregations lose sight of this uncompromising commitment and fall into factions and rivalries and ultimately decline. This damages their effectiveness. St. Paul reminded the Corinthians of this in his letter to the congregation. "For when one says, "I follow Paul," and another, "I follow Apollos," are you not being merely human? What then is Apollos? What is Paul? Servants through whom you believed, as the Lord assigned to each. I planted, Apollos watered, but God gave the growth. So neither he who plants nor he who waters is anything, but only God who gives the growth. He who plants and he who waters are one, and each will receive his wages according to his labor. For we are God's fellow workers. You are God's field, God's building." (I Corinthians 3.4-9)

God provides the growth. If we continue to love one another and lead ministries that have a profound impact on the community, the Holy Spirit will be at work among us and God will provide the growth. The numbers we celebrate today will fall away to insignificance when we celebrate the growth God provides tomorrow.

Coming soon! Online Directory for Community Lutheran Church

Every so often, our paper membership directory gets picked up by scammers who then use that information to send out fake pleas from "Pastor Karis" asking for gift cards for her to distribute. (Pastor Karis will never ask for gift cards from you by text or email!) Securing your personal information and yet making it available to others in the church is a delicate balancing act. But we've found a solution!

Church Center is a website and a phone app (Android & Apple) directory. A directory is a private place for the people in the church to share their contact information. **Only people invited to the directory** can see the others or share their information. Each invited person can choose the information they want to show about themselves or their household.

Our council members have tried it and find it to be simple to set up and easy to use.

Best of all ... it's free!

In the future, we will be able to use this directory portal for other church-related items, including a calendar, donation form, groups, and registration for events.

But let's not get ahead of ourselves. The first step is to create the directory. Here is how that will happen:



1. You will soon receive an email invitation asking you to sign-up for the directory.

2. It will come from <u>no-reply@churchcenter.com</u> and will look like this.

3. After pressing the blue "Join Directory" button, you will be prompted to follow the steps to create an account and add the information you want to

have shared (Name, Phone Number, Address).

4. If you encounter any problems, you may contact me at:

<u>earljanssen@comcast.net</u>.

5. You may download the Church Center app to your phone. This is our unique setup QR Code for the Church Center app.

Some have asked how to get their photos onto the new online directory. It's easy! Go to the Church Center app on your phone. At the very top of the screen tap the icon to the right of the bell. Click on the top panel (My profile & settings) Click Contact and profile information Click Update Photo and follow the prompts.

Remember, having your photo available helps us to get to know one another.

Some have asked about phone numbers showing up in the directory.

For security purposes those haven't been shown yet.

Council will be discussing this at the next meeting.

In any event, you get to determine what information is shared in the church directory through the settings you mark within the app.
