Pastor Karis Message

Culture matters. Context matters. Family history matters.

Do you remember a time when you asked a question in a group that was not only inappropriate but culturally insensitive?

Let me share one story.

I said about the dumbest thing possible with family members - cousins that are Monacan and Eastern Band Cherokee tribal members.

It was early in November when I traveled to the Shenandoah mountains to gather at their home after a long journey to find them. After all, it had been four decades that our history with one another had been erased due to the shame of being who we are as family.

One chilly evening, we sat outside around a fire talking about our ancestors. I soaked in every story as a sponge as they helped fill in the blanks of time, place, tradition and history.

Then, after a time of silence, I asked, "What are you all doing for Thanksgiving?"

There was a silent second that was prolonged in motion within the night air for what seemed like hours.

There was the eye roll by one sister while another laughed and replied, "Colonizer Cousin, we need to teach you some things about our history. And our ancestors".

Gulp.

The unfamiliarity with my own family history showed ignorance and insensitivity all at once.



It was clear that the Thanksgiving story deeply rooted in my elementary school curriculum framed the Pilgrims as heroes and placed the Wampanoag Indians to subservient supporting roles.

This early childhood narrative also erased a monumentally sad history.

Many of my cousins do not romanticize the 1621 encounter between our ancestors and English settlers because the traditional narratives erase the deadly conflicts that followed for indigenous people. The Thanksgiving narrative I learned as a kid, while pleasant, isn't terribly accurate. I've learned over the years and now deeply understand that when I pay homage to the Pilgrims and their "bravery" and react to the tragic background of America's founding myth with silence, I support a mindset that only some people's history

matters. Culture matters. Context matters. Family history matters.

As years have passed, I've read a lot about Thanksgiving. James Loewen authored a helpful read entitled, "Plagues & Pilgrims: The Truth about the First Thanksgiving". He writes, "The antidote to feel-good history is not feel-bad history, but honest and inclusive history."

Culture matters. Context matters. Family history matters.

So what do I do on Thanksgiving? I honor my ancestors. And yes, I give thanks.

I still find space to have a heart of gratitude. While we talk to Creator a lot about what we want, we are called to be mindful to take time to give thanks to the Holy. I not only say "please" in prayer, no matter the season or holiday---but Culture matters. Context matters. Family history matters. I also say "Thank You." Thank you for my ancestors. Thank you for abundance. Thank you for my brothers and sisters who continue to teach me who I am. Thank you for bringing me home, Creator. Thank you for teaching me the truth.

Thank you for making my ancestors brave and resilient in the face of disease and terror. Thank you for your presence, Creator.

Food Pantry Ministry

We had a significant increase in October of our clients that we faithfully serve. It wasn't long ago that we reached our highest number of families, 70, coming to us for food and personal care items. Then we broke that record with 86 families coming to our doors in October. Then, on November 5th we served 100 clients. I thank God and you, the extended team, for caring for His children.

The holidays are upon us and again this year Mountaire will be supplying Thanksgiving boxes. We requested 75 boxes (the maximum) and have been approved for 75. That's the good news. But, by October 17th we had 72 families and now that number has risen to over 100. These boxes have one holiday meal in them which will be distributed on November 23rd. The folks at the Estuary will be donating turkeys again this year and our congregation may do so as well. Turkeys needed may be between 10 to 18 pounds.

Also, if you would like to help prepare bags and/or boxes of the food items that we normally distribute, please be at the church the morning of November 23rd by 8:30 am. Once the bags and boxes are packed there is no need to stay. Our families will be coming to the church around 10am and we should finish with distribution and cleanup by noon. This is a drive thru distribution, so only 4 or 5 people will be needed to place the food into the vehicles.

ITEMS NEEDED for each family box

Turkey Mashed potatoes - I box Gravy, package/can (no glass) Green beans - 2 cans Dried onions - I package Mushroom soup - I can Corn - I can Stuffing mix - I box Marconi and cheese - I box Sweet potatoes - I can Apple sauce/plastic (no glass) Cranberry sauce - I can Candy - Snacks - Pies - Rolls

The new focus of the Monday Study Group A reading and discussion of "SOUL BOOM" a book by Rainn Wilson Every Monday, Oct 28 – Dec 16th 10:30 am in the Luther Hall

A book to challenge everyone with enlightenment, laughter, tears and ah aha's. Soul Boom, a concocted name for a sort of proposed new world religion, is not so important, but the fundamentals proposed for this new way of thought are worthy of much discussion. The reasons for "Why we need a spiritual revolution" are all around us. Wilson presents them, painful as they are, for what they really are. Wilson's approach to spirituality – the non-physical, eternal aspects of ourselves – is relatable and applies to people of all beliefs, even the skeptics. It is filled with genuine insight – not to mention enlightening Kung Fu and Star Trek references.

This is NOT a Bible Study nor a lecture. Portions of the book are to be read as "homework" and then in the meeting a moderator will ask leading questions to stimulate sharing of thoughts and insights.

25th Anniversary of the Joint Declaration on the Doctrine of Justification

"I am the vine; you are the branches. Those who abide in me and I in them bear much fruit, because apart from me you can do nothing." — John 15:5

Twenty-five years ago today, Catholic and Lutheran representatives gathered in Augsburg, Germany, to sign the Joint Declaration on the Doctrine of Justification (JDDJ), thereby resolving once and for all a central theological conflict of the Reformation.

The JDDJ announced theological consensus on how Catholics and Lutherans understand justification by God's grace through faith in Christ, lifting 16th-century condemnations. After merely three decades of dialogue, what had divided us as Lutherans and Catholics for nearly 500 years, no longer does.

Many of us remember that day as if it were yesterday. Even more of us have experienced how the JDDJ paved the way for us to commemorate the 500th anniversary of the Reformation in 2017 differently, by doing so together. In recent years, three more world communions — Anglican, Methodist and Reformed - have affirmed the JDDJ.

As we recall these significant milestones, let us remember that they were the God-given fruits of our theological dialogue together, harvested through the labors of our steadfast theologians and leaders. Our commitment is to abide in Christ and with each other, taking the long approach in a quick-fix world.

We are now on the eve of the 60th anniversary of our U.S. Lutheran-Catholic dialogue. As we hope for all that is yet to be, let us pause to give thanks for all that has been on the way.

Gracious God, we give you thanks for the promises you freely offer to us through the life, death and resurrection of our Lord, Jesus Christ. Guide us in our journey together as a faithful response to your love. Amen.
