increasingly diverse congregation. Scripture offers some guidance—Hebrews 10:25 calls us not to neglect meeting together.

However, Scripture doesn't specify exactly when or where to meet. What it emphasizes is why we meet—to encourage one another. When we strip away all the extraneous details and start thinking outside of the box, we'll find countless ways to encourage one another. The essence of our gathering is that we must stay true, but how and where we meet can be more flexible than we might have imagined. All ministries will continue to explore ways to meet outside of the building as we live within our greater community. We will explore ways to make the worship space reflective of our openness as a congregation.

Moving Forward: Embracing Fluidity and Adaptability As we think outside of the box, we will remain grounded in prayer, stay true to the radically inclusive nature of Jesus, and follow the guidance of the Holy Spirit. When we do, we'll discover a fluidity that allows us to adapt to new situations without being confined by rigidity. Thinking outside of the box means constantly evaluating how we can better serve God and others, not just within the walls of our church but beyond them. By focusing on our community

and the mission of Jesus, we will continue to create ministries that are both innovative and


