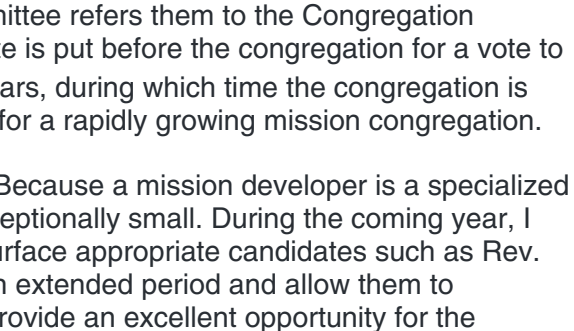
## Looking to the Future for our Mission and Vision



As most of you are aware, Pastor Karis's call as Lead Pastor will end in January 2027. However, she will be with us, building bridges for CLC at other locations throughout the community. She will still be actively involved in our ministries and the life of our congregation.

To continue bringing our vision to reality requires calling, as soon as possible, a full-time, Jesus-loving, progressive Lead Pastor with experience as a mission developer. In short, a worthy successor to Pastor Karis, one who is capable of stepping in and continuing the growth of our vision as a congregation.

The call process has already begun, and I am pleased and excited to announce that our first candidate is the Rev. Carla Christopher. She will join us on Sunday, June 15th, and be with us until July 13th. Rev. Christopher (she/they) is a rostered Minister of Word and Sacrament in the Evangelical Lutheran Church and the United Church of Christ. She is a certified Congregational Vitality Specialist (mission developer). Rev. Christopher is also a Diversity, Equity, Inclusion & Accessibility / Belonging Trainer specializing in LGBTQIA2S+ Cultural Competency & Racial Justice, Trauma-informed Care & Mindfulness, Nonviolent Communication, & Peacebuilding.



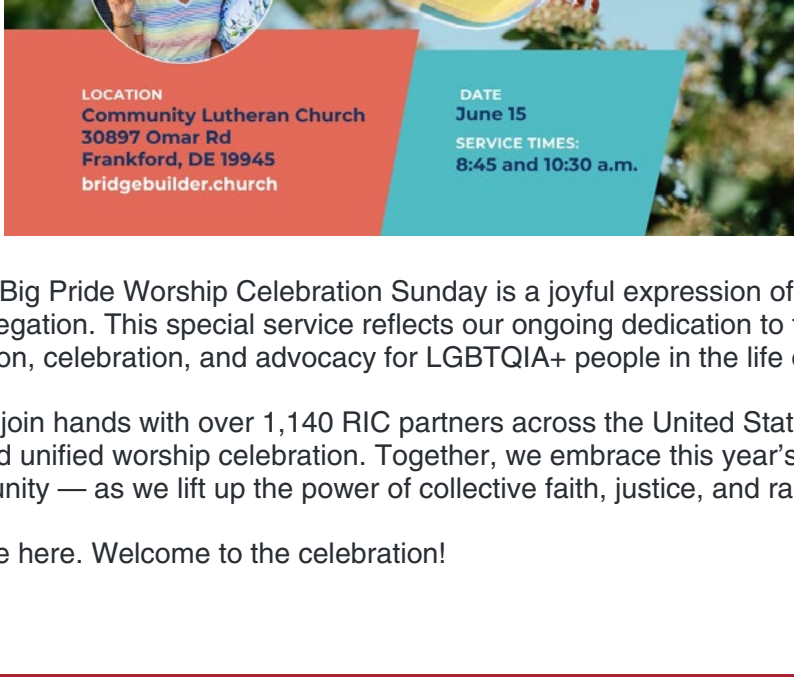
Our call process differs from the traditional Lutheran call process familiar to many of you. The traditional call process does not begin until after the current pastor departs and involves bringing in an interim pastor with responsibility to help discern the skillset the next pastor needs. Then, a Call Committee is formed, and they begin the process of interviewing candidates for the position. When a qualified candidate is found, the Call Committee refers them to the Congregation Council. Upon approval by the council, the candidate is put before the congregation for a vote to approve a call. This process can take one to two years, during which time the congregation is without a Lead Pastor. This process does not work for a rapidly growing mission congregation.

We are a mission congregation with a clear vision. Because a mission developer is a specialized talent within the church, the list of candidates is exceptionally small. During the coming year, I will collaborate directly with the Bishop's office to surface appropriate candidates such as Rev. Christopher. We are planning to bring them in for an extended period and allow them to participate in the life of the congregation. This will provide an excellent opportunity for the congregation and the candidate to decide whether they are a worthy successor to Pastor Karis. When an appropriate candidate is found, the congregation will vote to extend a call.

The Holy Spirit continues to work in and among all of us at CLC, and this makes for exciting times indeed! Bishop Gohl, Pastor Karis, and the Congregation Council share a common vision that CLC will bring to the community a multi-point parish with worship and community ministry taking place in satellite locations throughout the beach and surrounding communities. We will be out in the community sharing the love of Jesus and the ministries that are vital to the community. As we continue to reimagine our facilities and their highest and best use, we will do so in the light of building bridges through community ministry done by disciples of Jesus.

## One Big Pride Worship Celebration Sunday

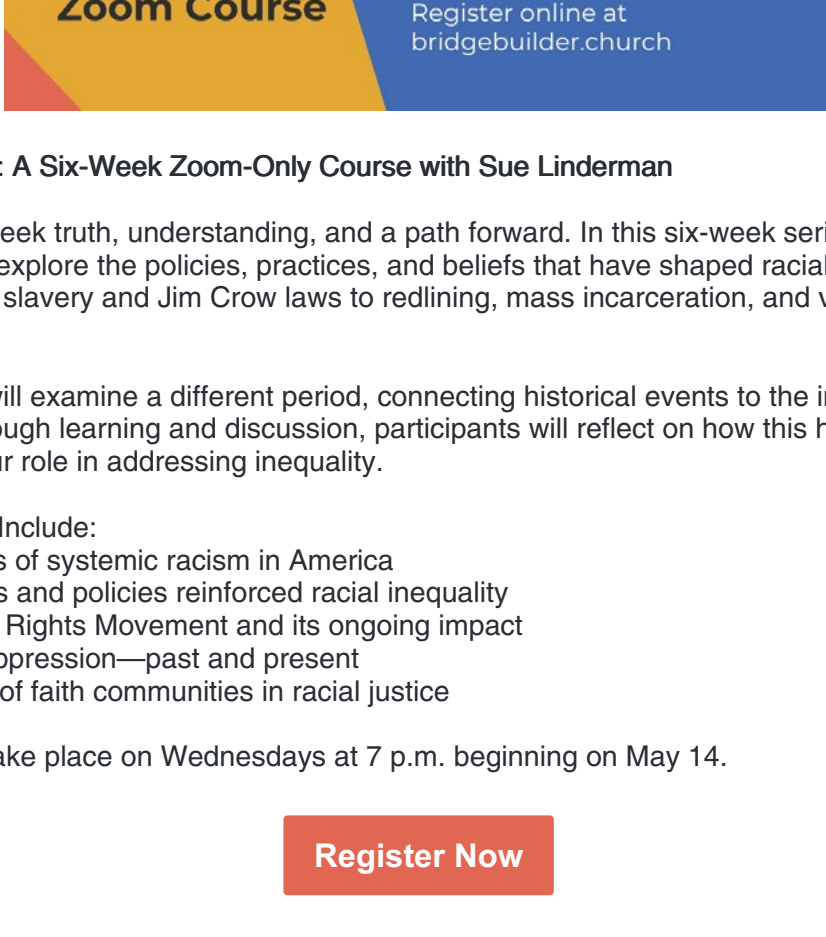

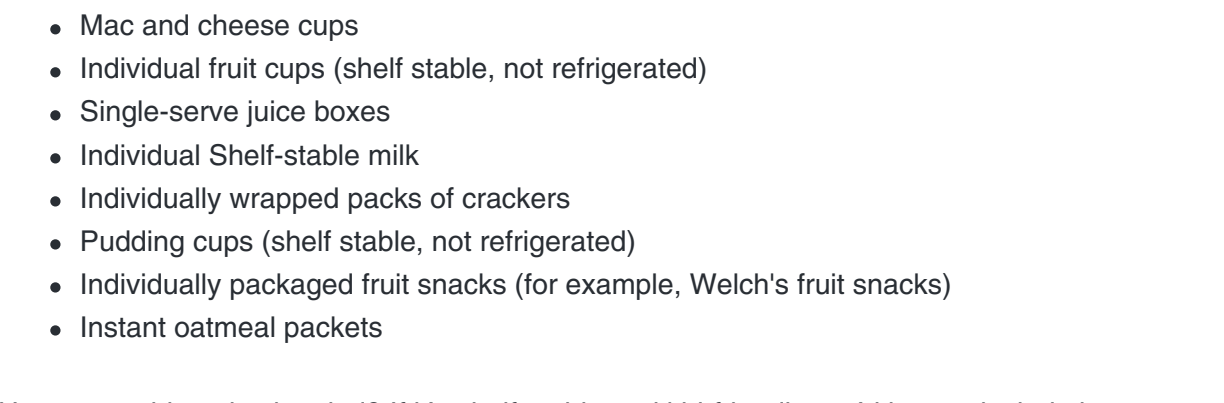
Course Topics Include:

## White Bag Ministry Begins June 16



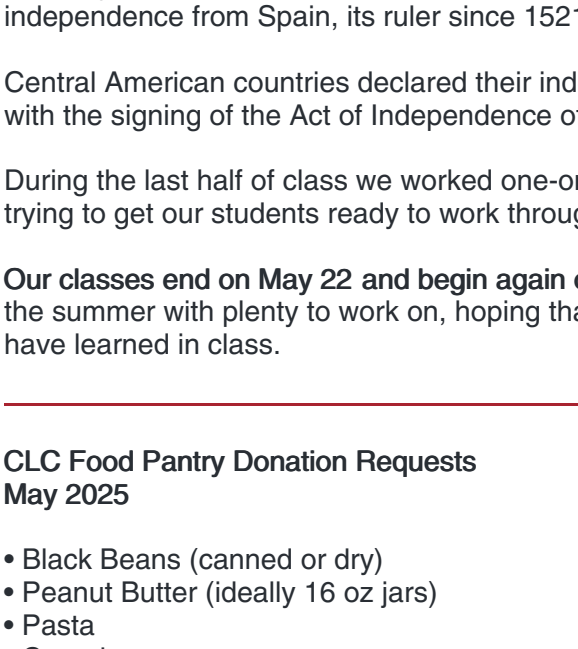

### ESL Update

At our opening round table, we talked about the months of the year, the holidays in each month, and how each of the students' home countries celebrate those holidays. We learned how to pronounce all the months, the dates of the months, and the years. We also learned a great deal of history from our proud students.

Cinco de Mayo is an annual celebration held on May 5 to celebrate Mexico's victory over the Second French Empire at the Battle of Puebla in 1862, led by General Ignacio Zaragoza.

El diez y seis de septiembre, or the Sixteenth of September, marks the beginning of Mexican independence from Spain, its ruler since 1521.

Central American countries declared their independence from Spain on September 15, 1821, with the signing of the Act of Independence of Central America.

During the last half of class we worked one-on-one in workbooks or on worksheets. We are trying to get our students ready to work through the workbook on their own.

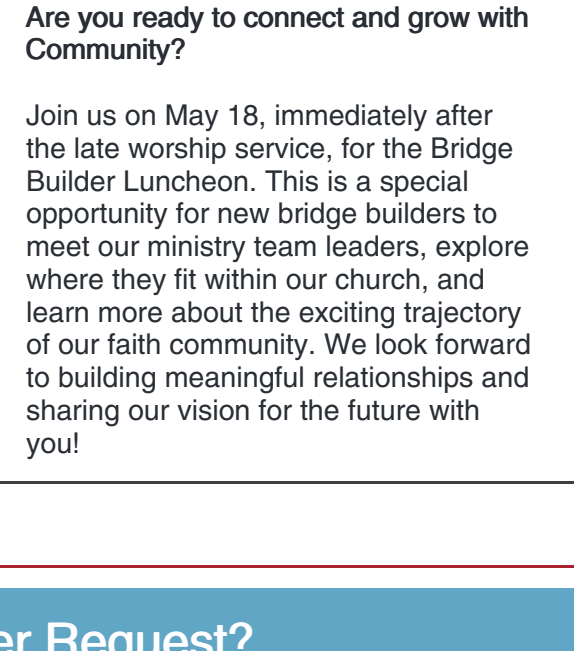
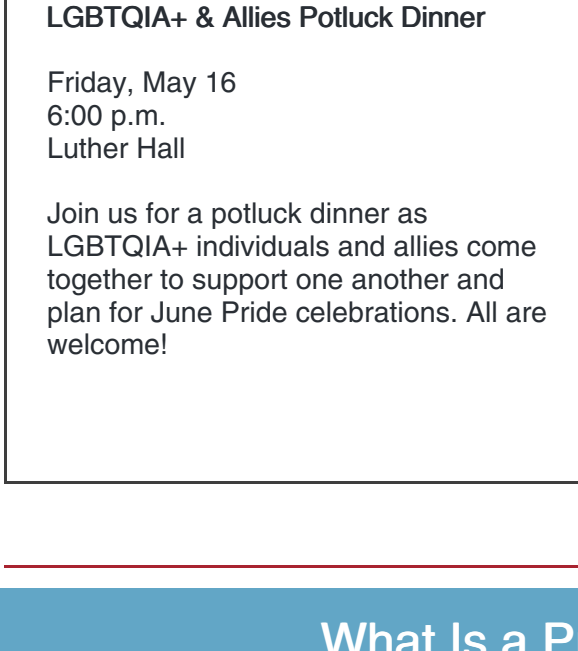
Our classes end on May 22 and begin again on September 4. We will send our students home for the summer with plenty to work on, hoping that they will continue to practice the English they have learned in class.

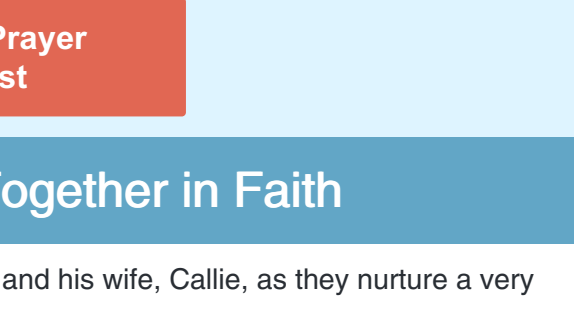
Join us for a potluck dinner as LGBTQIA+ individuals and allies come together to support one another and plan for June Pride celebrations. All are welcome!
